



IMPERSONATION OF SINGAPORE LAW PRACTICE – 3 AUGUST 2026

Impersonation of Singapore Law Practice

The Law Society of Singapore has been informed that a member of the public (“**Person X**”) was contacted by an individual named “Ms Lola Chen.”

Ms Lola Chen falsely claimed to be a client of Ashvin Law Corporation and asked Person X for assistance with her legal fees.

To perpetrate the fraud, Person X was provided with the following correspondence and documentation which falsely purported to originate from Ashvin Law Corporation:

- (a) a “Confidential Legal Memorandum / Case Update” regarding military court proceedings;
- (b) screenshots of WhatsApp messages between Ashvin Law Corporation and a “Ms Luna Chen”; and
- (c) a letter to Ms Lola Chen demanding that the firm’s “further retainer fee” be paid.

Ashvin Law Corporation has confirmed that it does not represent Ms Lola / Luna Chen in any matter, and that none of the correspondence and documentation listed above originated from Ashvin Law Corporation.

Person X was advised to lodge a police report.

Risk Management Tips

- Please remind your friends, colleagues, and clients to perform direct verification checks with you and/or your law firm, should they receive any correspondence (e.g. messages) purporting to be from you, your law firm, or from any individuals claiming to be represented by your firm – especially if no prior contact has been made.
- Should there be any doubts as to the authenticity of any correspondence, please contact the law firm directly for verification.
- To check whether a legal practitioner and/or law firm in Singapore is registered with the Legal Services Regulatory Authority (“**LSRA**”), please perform a search on the LSRA’s integrated search function at - <https://eservices.mlaw.gov.sg/lra/search-lawyer-or-law-firm/>. This same search function may be used to verify the telephone number of a law firm.
